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## COVID Cases Increasing Among Children

WHEELING — As the weekly number of new COVID-19 cases in Ohio County jumped yet again Monday, hospitals around West Virginia are straining against that rise in cases at crisis levels. The Wheeling-Ohio County Health Department announced

Monday that, between Sept. 12 and Monday, there have been 249 new cases reported in the county. That's a significant increase from the 194 announced in the previous weekly report. COVID cases also are going up among children. Ohio County had 98 new positives among children under 18 years old.

That's up from the 75 new cases among children in the previous weekly report. The department also reported one new COVID-related death. In the latest weekly report, WOCHD announced that there are 68 cases of the delta variant in the county, along with 86 cases of the alpha variant and

two cases of the gamma variant. According to the Department of Health and Human Resources COVID-19 dashboard, there have been 3,976 confirmed cases, 1,454 probable cases and 93 related deaths in Ohio County since the pandemic began.

### Barbers Donate Time, Talents In Teen's Memory

WHEELING — Local hair stylists offered their time and supplies and provided free haircuts Monday in memory of a Wheeling youth who died tragically.

About 50 people were scheduled to turn out for the trims, which took place throughout the afternoon Monday at the Youth Services System offices at the Hazel-Atlas Building in East Wheeling.

The haircuts were a public service program organized by Americorps-VISTA volunteer Shelby Fluharty for YSS.

She was inspired by the story of Caleb Smail, a 19-year-old who was murdered in January 2019 during a robbery. Monday would have been Smail's 22nd birthday.

"My initial thought was to do a free haircutting for the community," Fluharty explained. "We ended up tying the haircutting with Jen Stricklin, who is Caleb Smail's girlfriend's mother."

The haircut project then partnered with the Caleb Smail Kindness Project.

Stricklin, a beautician at the Posh salon, was among those donating their time and talent Monday. She was joined by Chad Stradwick of Stradwick's Fade Cave, Luke Steed of Stallion Cutz, Mandy Ware of Posh, and Sandi Bernosky of Classic Couture Hair and Nail.

CHARLESTON — As hospitals continue to fill with patients suffering from severe COVID-19 symptoms, West Virginia Gov. Jim Justice announced Monday a new task force aimed specifically at helping hospitals avoid rationing health care.

Justice met with state health and COVID-19 response officials Monday morning for a breakfast at the Governor's Mansion. Speaking Monday afternoon during his COVID-19 briefing, Justice said the result of that morning meeting was a new task force.

The task force is called Saving Our Care, a play on the Saving Our
