



The Prevention Services Department supports community-based coalitions in the delivery of comprehensive, evidence-based prevention strategies.




INTERVENTION BUILDING SKILLS

Expanded School-Based Mental Health is a multi-tiered system of support in which schools, families, and strategic community partners work together to enhance student mental health. Tier I provides prevention services to all students on topics including, but not limited to, suicide prevention and substance use prevention, as well as training for staff and faculty. Tier II focuses on early intervention with small student groups identified by the school as needing additional assistance. These groups work on building skills and resiliency. Tier III focuses on mental health treatment for students who may need referrals for assessments, evaluation, therapy, and/or psychiatric care. Additional supportive services are also available for youth and families, including youth life skills, employment program, and parenting education and support.



EXPANDED SCHOOL-BASED MENTAL HEALTH (ESBMH)

Students in schools with ESMH received 37% fewer disciplinary action (detention, in-school suspension, out-of-school suspension, or expulsion) this school year than last school year.




PARENTING/ LIFE SKILLS/ VISITATION


63% of parents/guardians maintained custody, regained custody, and/or improved parenting knowledge.

A young man entered our Transitional Living Program unable to see a bright future. Working through the program, he gained confidence and life skills. He learned to cook, clean, manage a budget and earned his high school diploma—something he once thought was impossible. The YSS Y.O.U. program provided work experience and structure which made securing an apartment possible while maintaining employment. His dedication and work with the program turned doubt in to long lasting success.

92% of clients entered employment, with 57% retaining employment for two months.






Coordinated community-based mental health and substance use services for youth and young adults aged 12-25





DEDICATED TEAM OF STAFF

A youth, who was experiencing significant anxiety due to family trauma, was referred to us for therapy. At that time, they were failing classes, skipping school, and having frequent arguments with their family. Eventually they decided they wanted more for themselves, more out of life, and started therapy sessions. After a year of therapy services, they are doing well in school, maintaining good relationships with their family, and engaging in activities with peers. They recognize the progress they have made and continue in therapy services, sharing they find very helpful in maintaining control over their thoughts and anxiety.










Dr. Jill Bradshaw, MD, a doctor of Child and Adolescent Behavioral Medicine and Psychiatry shared, “it has been a true pleasure and privilege to work with Youth Services System (YSS) as a contracted Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist for almost nine years, providing evaluations and helping to treat children and adolescents who reside at Helinski Shelter, Samaritan House, and Ronald Mulholland Juvenile Center. The mission and services of YSS have had a profound and lasting impact on countless individuals in our community and state by offering support to people during some of the most fragile times in their lives. In my role, I assess the biological, psychological, and social factors that contribute to mental and behavioral health concerns and recommend treatment with the ultimate goal of improving each child’s daily functioning and ability to successfully transition to their next level of care. While I strive to make a difference in the lives of the youth I serve, I have found that they have equally impacted mine. The resilience, vulnerability, and hope I have witnessed in these young individuals, most of whom have experienced significant hardships, have deeply shaped my perspective and enriched my life. I am grateful for the opportunity to work at Youth Services System and for the impact they have had on our community.”

RESIDENTIAL OUTCOMES MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Youth Services System, Inc. has provided emergency youth shelters and services since our founding in 1974. Samaritan House and Helinski Shelter serve youth ages **8-18** from across West Virginia who are in the Department of Human Services custody.



RONALD C MULHOLLAND JUVENILE CENTER(RCMJC)

A secure, co-ed juvenile detention facility for residents ages **10-21** with criminal charges, where they receive education and treatment services while involved in court proceedings and awaiting discharge planning.

We provide a behavioral modification phase system with individualized service plans, age-appropriate life skills, individual and group counseling, therapy, religious services, recreational activities, medical services, case management, and medication evaluation and management. A year-round on-grounds educational program is also provided.

CLIENT SUCCESS-This year, among many staff whose success bridges the gap between Client Success and Staff Success, we are honored to highlight Kenny Jarrell.

No stranger to challenges and chaos, Kenny was in active addiction when he was separated from his daughter and started spending the night at our Winter Freeze Shelter. He later entered rehabilitation at Harmony Ridge. Nine months later, he became a resident at our Mark's House, one of the recovery homes.

FINDING HOPE-When he thought all hope was lost, he was tattered, worn, and had nothing to live for. Kenny found recovery was his path to reunification with his daughter and wife.

SECOND CHANCE-YSS gave Kenny a second chance as he rebuilt his life. He was hired as a maintenance worker, where Kenny continued to thrive. He later became the recovery house manager at Mark's House and now holds certifications as a Peer Recovery Support Specialist (PRSS) in Substance Use and Mental Health. Kenny found hope and is weaving together a life worth living.

CONGRATULATIONS, Kenny, and thank you for giving hope to others who struggle to find a second chance and reunification.

One of our alumni, Vince McPherson, graduated from Ohio County Family Treatment Court (FTC). He invited staff of the recovery homes to be present and gave us, and his Peer Recovery Support Specialist Kenny Jarrell a shout-out for all the help and support he received along the way. Vince is officially reunited with his children and is our 3rd alumni to graduate from FTC.



WEST VIRGINIA ALLIANCE OF RECOVERY RESIDENCES (WVARR)

Youth Services System Inc. has a total of 14 beds certified by WVARR for men in recovery from substance use disorder and five beds dedicated to women. WVARR is a network of recovery homes in West Virginia that promotes best practices for long-term recovery.

Our three recovery homes are first and foremost a community of people in recovery. Lazarus House and Mark's House for men and Mary & Martha House for women. We create a loving, safe, and supportive space for women and men that makes it easier for individuals to make healthy choices. Our residents engage in community service around the Ohio Valley, partnering with various organizations to make a positive impact.


